Despite the much publicized decentralization, a subject debate still exists on which is the best tenure regime among state, private and common. The central pillar underlying this debate can be scrutinized in three dimensions of forest resources, livelihoods and governance. Forest cover, stocking levels and tree diversity were analysed to entail status of the forest condition under the new tenure regime.
